Politics And Narcotics

Even after the large busting of drugs under the 'Spector 2.0' operation held by the countries Canada, Sudan and Cuba where 2600 kg of illicit fentanyl was busted, that was manufactured at Zimbabwe and Ireland, there is no specific progression in the UNODC regarding the ever-increasing problem of opioid use. The drugs were said to be transported for "pharmaceutical purposes" but were never delivered to any pharmaceutical companies either governmental or private. It was being transported for the illegal manufacture of cocaine and allegedly 42 Indians were involved in this. The 42 Indians have been blamed to be running the cartel out of which 12 are allegedly government officials. The other 30 Indians were also indirectly involved with the government.

Following such an important incident, it has caused unrest in the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime. The countries that have been blamed instead of solving each other have started to blame other countries after the crisis. According to the interview of an anonymous source, their saying is that the sole purpose of the committee was to solve problems regarding substance abuse and organized crime. However, after the crisis countries have constantly been blaming each other for the increase of problems relating opioids.

According to the source an emergency never comes when we are prepared. When there are problems, the committee needs solutions. The committee had panicked and instead of collaborating. When asked what could be the contribution of China or other big countries that are the original members of the United Nations, the delegate answered that countries like Russia and Sudan are giving their contributions but are still not playing a very huge role in preventing the drug supply chain mainly because a part of their economy revolves around drugs.

On the other hand countries like China have the potential to stop such rackets but they themselves are involved in such supply chains. China tends to play the game of the observer and only enters when it finds profit in any sense. Highlighting the information, according to sources, China is allegedly the largest producer and transporter of illicit fentanyl. It isn't really possible to solve such problems without the unanimous support of all the countries which are potentially capable of putting a stop to the opioid chain.

UNITED NATIONS OFFICE ON DRUGS AND CRIME: CRISIS

The United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime was simulated at SAJMUN'23, we proceeded with the agenda "Deliberation on Convention Against Transnational Organized Crime with regards to drug trafficking with special emphasis on the opioid crisis." and it was a rather vocal and a conclusive committee.

The first committee session saw the delegates voicing their opinions and debating on the impact on pharmaceutical industries on the salient issue of drug trafficking. Recognizing the devastating impact of drug trafficking on societies, we put forth a pressing discussion on the hideous methods in the name of which the pharmaceutical industry conducts such illicit activities.

Our woke delegates deliberated on the root causes and consequences of the opioid crisis and our last committee session saw a moderated caucus on the solutions to this menacing real world problem and a combined press release was presented to the executive board. Overall, our delegates reaffirmed their commitment to combating and addressing the treacherous issue of drug trafficking and opioid crisis with the help of the UNTOC through a comprehensive approach encompassing law enforcement and international cooperation.

A crisis was introduced by the executive board in collaboration with a journalist from Reuters to stir things up in the committee and a significant drug scandal was caught that manufactured, supplied and consumed drugs from all major superpowers of the world. This saw the delegates coming one to one to both, defend their stance and offend the other member nations and an array of counter attacks, sword plays and repartee took the committee to a new paramount of discussion, equity and exhilaration.



UNITED NATIONS SECURITY COUNCIL

In a pivotal gathering of international delegates, the United Nations Security Council (UNSC)

We are no strangers to the Israel–Palestine conflict, the conflict which is in itself a part of a bigger conflict ,i.e., the Arab Israeli conflict. This ongoing conflict is off a dispute that has arisen between the states of Israel and Palestine over a piece of land which used to come under the territory of Palestine. Now the evident or clear solution that you might come upon is the 2–State solution which will mean that the land would be divided into two parts and each part will be allotted separately to Israel and Palestine respectively. But that does not seem to work out for the members of the committee of United Nations Human Rights Council.

The delegate of Pakistan rose to give his solution in the committee where he voiced his concern regarding this burning issue between the two countries. The delegate of Pakistan was considered a Pro–Palestinian country by the whole committee and was majorly in favor of it. The two–state solution that we talked about earlier was the idea proposed by the delegate of Pakistan. The delegate was of the thought that having a different and elected government will prove to be more efficient.

It turns out that this thought process of Pakistan was not all that unique and was shared by the delegate of Qatar where the delegate also wished for a separate Palestine. Moving further away from the topic of the two–state solutions Netherlands mentioned the gruesome effects of the forced displacement of the civilians from the country and the genocide of the people whereas the delegate of Myanmar talked of the increasing instability in the pool region. This was also an instance where the issue of providing the countries with separate capital territory emerged. Japan actively supported the view and urged the UN to remove the policies.

DISARMAMENT AND INTERNATIONAL SECURITY

ART OF WAR AND THE EVIL CALLED TALIBAN

“Japan stands for peace and disarmament. We consider ourselves a guardian of peace, not just for our own people but for humanity worldwide” says the delegate of Japan in their opening speech. They mention a lot of points about the devastating effects of proxy wars stating that they are the reason behind many countries coming close to a third world war. The delegate does not fail to mention that Japan as a civilization aims to prevent possible nuclear Armageddon as it firmly believes that proxy wars should be avoided.

The delegate of USA starts his speech by simplifying the agenda for all the members of the committee by simplifying every word with utmost precision. He goes on with his speech and talks about Taliban and the ‘horrendous and malicious’ acts that it has done in Afghanistan. The Taliban was formed in Pakistan in the 1990’s. According to experts Pakistan now desires an Afghan government that includes the Taliban and is friendlier towards Islamabad than it is to New Delhi. ALL INDIA POLITICAL PARTIES MEET

The AIPPM (All Indian Political Party Meet) is being held at Seth Anandram Jaipuria where all the Political Parties of the largest democracy of the world are given the liberty to provide a diverse viewpoint before the actual legislative process. The agenda of AIPPM for the 9th edition of SAJMUN is "deliberation upon the electoral reform with special emphasis on religious vote bank and freedom of speech during elections." A total of 74 delegates have gathered in this prestigious conference to share the views and opinions of their parties on the given topic. During the course of the first committee session Eknath Shinde spoke in support of BJP, ironically pointing fingers at the fallen government of Uddhav Thackrey, "We won't support a person who doesn't follow the ideology of our party."

Sachin Pilot (INC) questioned the current Prime Minister of India, Mr. Narendra Modi on the recent, unforeseen seize on the issuing of 2000 rupee notes by The Reserve Bank of India. The scoffing Sachin Pilot interrogated, "Modiji aap note band karte rahenga yah desh ka vikas karenge?"

The second session began with a poignant speech of Sanjay Singh (AAP) who threw some light on the contemporary villainous and illegitimate acts such as assassination of Atiq Ahmed and the Hathras gang rape and murder (2022).

K.Gopal announced in his controversial speech that "BJP now represents Hindus sadly". Yogi Adityanath (BJP), the Chief Minister of the most populated state of India commenced his speech with an impressive assertion, "I am an Indian and India is my identity." He later dropped the stats of the decreased crime and rape rates in India and Uttar Pradesh ever since BJP has been elected by the Indian citizens as their representative. He stated in his speech that there has been a 10% drop in rape cases and an 8.9% drop in criminal acts.
